Terracycle

Terracycle was formed in 2001 as a private company in the USA and has since become international. It is a means to recycle and reuse otherwise discarded plastic that is not dealt with in generally available recycling schemes.

Terracycle recycles, up cycles and reuses plastic waste that would otherwise be landfill/incinerated. This moves vast amounts of plastic waste from a linear to a circular system allowing it to cycle in the economy.

How it works; manufacturers sponsor a scheme (knowing full well their product comes wrapped in plastic that none of us want) they offer credits to an individual or organisation. Credits are based on the weight or number of items returned to them. Each manufacturer is very specific in what they will accept but more and more firms are signing up to the scheme in the face of public pressure.

Walkers crisps have recently joined despite saying last year that it would take them until 2025 to recycle. Clearly they got fed up with people posting empty packets back to their freepost address. Nestle have also just joined.

To date 202,831,611 people are recycling. 7,762,174,415 items have been recycled rather than landfilled across 22 countries raising \$44,806,327 (£35,001,582.49 as of 16th May 2019) for charitable organisations.

As a community we combine our recycling to turn it into funds to use within the community.
